

Children and Chores: Building Responsibility and Self-Sufficiency

The amount of work that we do to take care of our children and to keep up around the house can leave us exhausted and overwhelmed. Having children help out with chores around the house will not only help get everything done, but will also teach children responsibility and develop life-long skills. Remember that it may be difficult at first for children. Be sure to give them specific instructions and show them how to do what you are asking of them. This initial investment may be frustrating, but as your child becomes more capable of helping out around the house, you will know it was worth the effort.

Not sure what kinds of chores are appropriate for your child? Each child will be capable of different things at different ages, but here are some good general guidelines:

2-3 Years Old: Put toys in toy box, stack books on shelf, put dirty clothes in hamper, throw trash away, fold washcloths, dust baseboards, set the table

4-5 Years Old: Wipe up spills, put toys away, sort silverware, dry and put away dishes, feed pets, make bed, use hand-held vacuum, water houseplants, prepare simple snacks

Create a chore chart, hold children accountable, and praise them for a job well done!



So far the children are doing well with recognizing the sounds associated with each letter. Finally, this month the children also learned about sink and float. The children even did hands on activities to understand what objects sink and what objects float. In the month of February we will con-

tinue our letter-sound lesson. Also, because the children enjoyed Science so much, we have decided to extend our lesson of science. This month we will be focusing on weather. We will learn about thermometers and see what the temperature is outdoors. The children will also look outside and be asked to identify what the weather is. We can't wait to get this month started!

Ms. Jane's Koalas Class 5-year-olds


